#### Medina County Earth Day Festival, April 2024



This program offered trees, shrubs, and native seeds to HOAs looking to stop mowing on common areas, especially near streams. By re-naturing previously mowed areas the HOAs save gas and help filter stormwater.




## Strongsville HOA Re-Naturing Program Spring 2024

In total over 800 native trees and shrubs were planted, and native seeds were installed on over 10 acres of land.

Many of the HOAs chose to amend these now-natural areas with walking trails, benches to enjoy nature, bird houses, and more. This program demonstrates how previously un-used land can become a beautiful community feature and protect nature at the same time!










**Greenbriar Valley Floodplain** and Wetland Restoration





This year RRWC purchased a rainfall simulator education tool for use in watershed outreach. This tool shows how erosion occurs at different rates depending on surface cover, vegetation levels, and impervious materials. Our partners, Medina SWCD, used this tool at their County Fair, where it reached over 640 people. It has continued to serve the watershed through several school events and Medina County's Agriculture Day.





# Landowner Assistance (year-round)





One of RRWC's core services remains providing landowner assistance site visits, free of charge, to anyone in the watershed. These services have been used by private residents, public institutions, HOAs, and many others.

Site visits and consultations can provide a guide on many issues such as how to address erosion, whether a potential problem can be managed or left alone, and how residents can help protect our streams.



### Medina County Invasive Species Buy-Back program:

In 2024 RRWC sponsored and helped fund replacing invasive species with natives in the Medina County Invasive Species Buy-Back program.

71 people were reached. 44 invasives were cut including:

- 13 Callery Pears
- 6 Burning Bush
- 6 Bayberry
- 5 Bush Honeysuckles
- 6 Autumn Olive
- 3 Buckthorn
- 3 Privet
- 2 Multiflora Rose.

Trees were given out to replace the invasives cut.







August 2024

Participants learned how to divert stormwater into green spaces, such as lawns or gardens, and how this practice can reduce flooding and improve water quality in nearby streams.






# Stream Stewards Program

RRWC was a guest agency at Medina County SWCD's Stream Steward Certification Program. 14 people attended 7 weeks of classes around stream health, native & invasive plants, green infrastructure and became certified stewards. RRWC assisted in teaching stream chemistry and presented on the continuing efforts day, to encourage future efforts in the watershed.

### Pollinator Garden Planting, Olmsted Township

In September volunteers with RRWC and Cuyahoga SWCD implemented watershed-friendly landscaping methods to plant a pollinator garden in Olmsted Township. Participants learned about how native plants not only feed pollinators and native wildlife, but also soak up more rainwater, help build healthy soils, and filter stormwater before it hits the creek.





Water Quality Monitoring Program

Throughout the year volunteers monitor streams for pollutants through this program, run jointly with Cleveland Metroparks. Thank you stream monitors!





# Shrink Your Lawn with Native Plants

Middleburg Heights

In September participants in a "Shrink Your Lawn" workshop received native plants to jump-start their efforts. By replacing turf grass with native plants whose roots are much deeper, you too can help filter rainwater before it drains to the Rocky River. ## Green Yards Healthy Homes

(several workshops throughout the year)

At this workshop members of the public learn what pollutants can be found in common household cleaners and fertilizers, as well as the effect on the watershed when those products wash away. Earth-friendly alternative recipes are shared and this year free soil test kits were available thanks to NEORSD, with which residents can test how much (if any) fertilizer they might truly need. 






Live Staking North Royalton, November 2024
